BIO

Eleni Bastéa was born and grew up in Thessaloniki, Greece. She is the recipient of several grants and awards, including the Graham Foundation Grant and the ACSA New Faculty Teaching Award. She is the author of *The Creation of Modern Athens: Planning the Myth* (Cambridge University Press, 2000), winner of the John D. Criticos Prize, and a finalist for the Sir Steven Runciman Award. The book was also published in Greek (author's translation): *Athens 1834-1896: Neoclassical City Planning and Greek National Consciousness* (Libro, 2008). She is also the editor and a contributing author of the *Memory and Architecture* (University of New Mexico Press, 2004). She is currently working on two books: *Time of the Doves: Cultural Exchanges among Greeks and Turks* and *The Hungry Heart: Feeding the Creative Spirit.* Bastéa is co-editor of *Contemporary Indigenous Architecture: Local Traditions, Global Winds,* with Theodore (Ted) Jojola and Lynn Paxson, under contract with the University of New Mexico Press. She is also part of the editorial team of the British art magazine *.Cent* as creative associate and architecture editor. Bastéa has lectured at several universities in the US and Europe.

In addition to her position in architecture, Bastéa is associate director of the International Studies Institute at UNM (2012-13), and will assume the position of the director in August 2013. She also holds a courtesy appointment at the Dept. of Art and Art History at UNM and is affiliate faculty of the Center for Middle Easter Studies at the University of Arizona.

PROJECTS
